


# Knowledge of the Bible

## How well do Presbyterians know the Bible?

On several occasions I’ve heard people remark that most Presbyterians aren’t very knowledgeable about the Bible. (I’ve even said it myself.) In November 2011 we decided to test that impression by asking 40 biblical-content questions to representative groups of Presbyterians.

Not surprisingly, pastors—who were all seminary educated—turned out, with some exceptions, to be very knowledgeable. More than 8 in 10 received an A or a B on the exam. Only 2 percent failed. The median pastor responded correctly to 90 percent of the questions (A–).

Results for people in the pews were less stellar. The median member answered only 29 questions correctly (72 percent, or a C–), and almost 1 in 3 received an F. Only around 1 in 3 got either an A (14 percent) or a B (24 percent).

On balance, I’d conclude there’s more than a kernel of truth in the supposition that most Presbyterians aren’t all that familiar with the Bible.

Because we’ve never tested Presbyterians’ biblical knowledge systematically before, there’s no way to compare these results with those of an earlier period. But with these results as a benchmark, we’ll ask the questions again in a few years to monitor the trend.
