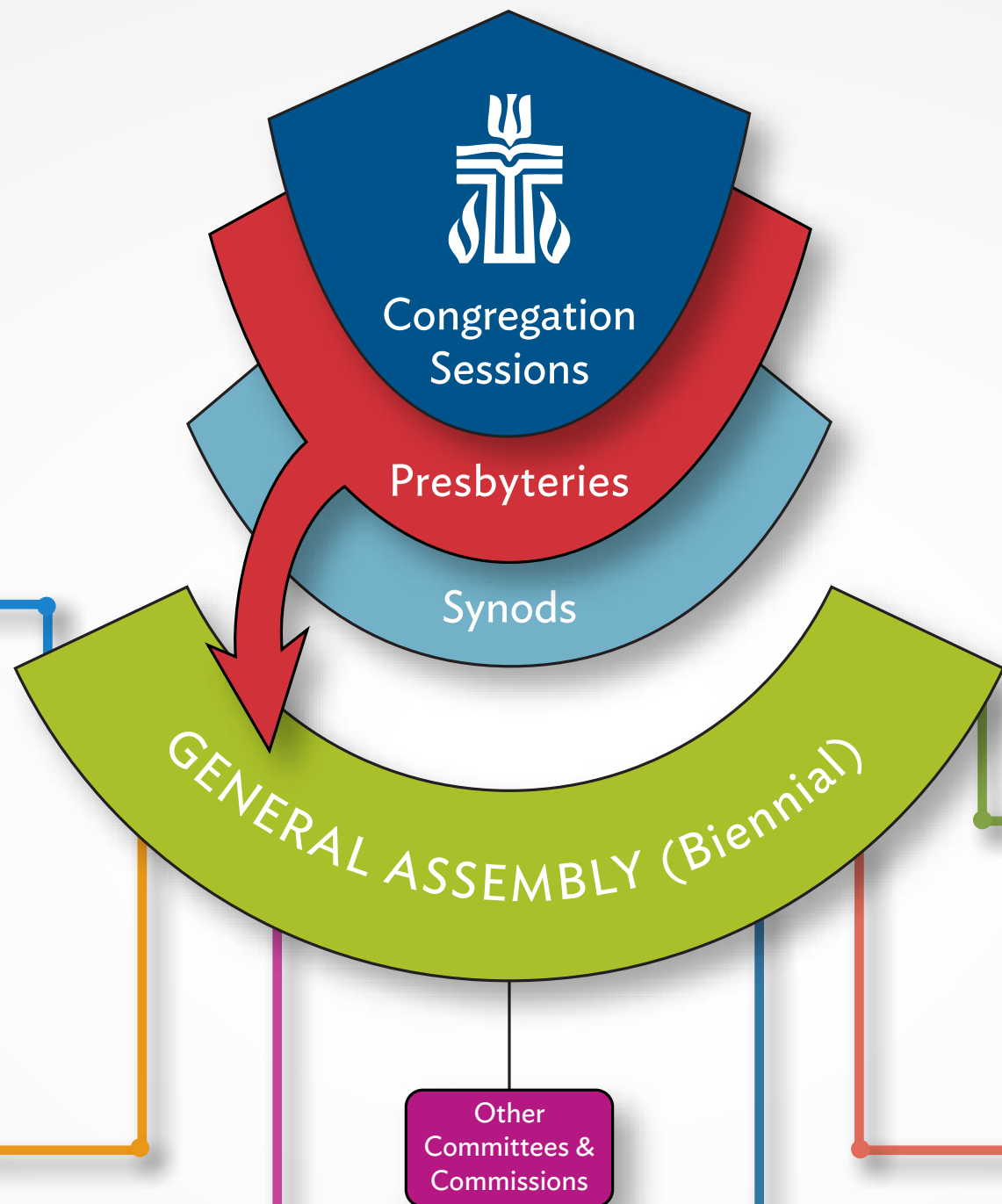



The Board of Pensions

The Board of Pensions embodies the care and concern of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) for its servants. It is a not-for-profit corporation under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The PC(USA) chartered the agency to administer the church Benefits Plan. Through its Assistance Program, the agency also provides financial assistance to eligible church workers and their families and supports vocational training of clergy. The Board does not set church policy. It designs plans and programs to reflect the normative values of the church, serving 50,000 church workers, retired church workers, and their families. A board of directors, elected by the General Assembly, governs the Board of Pensions.

The Presbyterian Foundation

The Presbyterian Foundation was established in 1799 to raise, steward, and distribute funds for mission. A vital part of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the Foundation is committed to strengthening congregations, mid councils, and other church agencies and entities by developing gifts and managing funds on their behalf and working with them to build communities of generosity among their members and constituents. We provide all Presbyterians an avenue to realize their philanthropic goals through a variety of giving options and maintain a strong focus on the Reformed values that guide our stewardship and investment. The Foundation raised more than \$30 million in new gifts and investments in 2013 and delivered \$55.8 million in mission funds. Through the generosity of faithful Presbyterians, over the past five years the Foundation has made available more than \$325 million for the work and mission of the church.

Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program (PILP)

The Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program (PILP) provides low-cost loans to Presbyterian churches and entities that are building, expanding, remodeling, or reshaping ministry space. Funds come from PC(USA) endowments plus investments from members, churches, and church governing bodies. Investors participate by purchasing interest-bearing term notes. PILP uses these investments to make loans to churches for capital projects. The churches repay the loans with interest, some of which goes back to investors. The remainder covers PILP’s operating costs and provides capital to fund more loans.

PPC publishes under four imprints: Westminster John Knox Press, Geneva Press, The Thoughtful Christian, and The Presbyterian Leader. PPC is also the publisher of *Glory to God*, the new denominational hymnal. PPC releases approximately 60 new titles each year, has a backlist of more than 2,000 titles, and sells its resources through major retailers and its own online marketplaces: TheThoughtfulChristian.com and ThePresbyterianLeader.com.
