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# Now may the Lord of peace . . . give you peace at all times in all ways.

— 2 Thessalonians 3:16

The second letter to the Thessalonians was written on the same theme as the first: the imminent return of Jesus, and the triumphal resolution of God's plan for all creation. The need for a second letter, though, arose from growing uneasiness, frustration, and fear within the church from those who thought this was supposed to have happened already. God's time was not the Thessalonian's time. As a result, fear and hopelessness gripped the church, resulting in divisions, mistrust, and dismay that began to sap the church of its vibrant ministry. Paul writes to encourage their continued faith and sure hope. In the midst of divisions and discord, he claims a God of peace who can bring peace at all times, in all ways.

The church of every time and place wrestles with the distance between our timeframe and expectations and God's. In God's time, even the small seeds we plant can grow into sturdy trees. In God's time, the fears we carry can be transformed into new partnership and hope. In God's time, our expectations can be expanded and surpassed by God's faithfulness. The 2018 Peace & Global Witness Offering encourages the church of our time to cast off anxiety and fear, discord and division, and embrace our reconciling God's mission to those around the corner and around the world. It is boundless peace God offers. It bursts through the shackles of time and expectation. It quiets the anxiety of each believer by joining us together, as we offer our prayer, Now, may the Lord grant us peace at all times in all ways.

#### **QUICK FACTS**

- Since 1940, World Communion Sunday is an ecumenical celebration of our oneness in the Spirit and the Gospel of Jesus Christ, bringing churches together in Christian unity.
- The Peace & Global Witness Offering builds on the Presbyterian Commitment to Peacemaking established in 1980.
- World Communion Sunday (October 7) is the most common Sunday for receiving the Offering, but many congregations promote the Offering throughout A Season of Peace (September 2 – October 7).
- 25% of the Offering stays with local congregations, and 25% with mid councils to unite congregations to support peacemaking in their regions. See page 5 for examples of how others have used their retained funds.
- ♦ 50% of this Offering supports the work for peace and reconciliation being done by Presbyterians across the globe.

### **MAKING A DIFFERENCE:**

#### **IDEAS FROM OUR CONGREGATIONS**

Here are some of the ways congregations and mid councils use their portion of the Peace & Global Witness Offering on behalf of those struggling through oppression and injustice.

#### How will these ideas inspire your congregation?

- Support of global issues
- Donate to programs working toward the elimination of all forms of human trafficking.
- Send participants on mission trips, to overseas work projects, or to attend global conferences.
- Support the work of a mission co-worker.
- Donate to a program working with people living with HIV/AIDS.

#### Peace education & training for children

- Organize local peace camps that teach children how to resolve conflict and handle angry and sad feelings.
- Work with your local middle or high school to create a monetary "peacemaker award" for a student per grade. That student then donates the money to an organization they feel promotes a kinder and more compassionate way of life.
- Support volunteers at a summer youth program.

#### Help for families in need

- Donate to programs helping teen mothers and single-parent families.
- Support a family resource center with things food stamps don't cover: diapers, shampoo, laundry soap, toilet paper, etc.
- Implement a backpack program, sending food home with schoolchildren over the weekend.

#### Assistance for teens and young adults

- Support Freedom Rising, a General Assembly initiative created to address and improve the plight of the African American male.
- Work with young women in correctional facilities.
- Support a ministry to help young adults who have "timed out" of the foster system but are still in college.

#### Community care and engagement

- Help fund educational assistance for veterans.
- Support the Institute for Civility in Government, which is devoted to creating a civil environment and a safe space for honest dialogue.
- Work with a support center for males transitioning out of prison or homelessness.
- Begin a Senior Companion Program that pairs senior citizens to help with light chores, errands, and transportation to the doctor.




### 2 PROMOTING THE OFFERING

#### **BEFORE THE OFFERING**

#### JUNE-JULY

- Ask your session to approve the receipt of the Peace & Global Witness Offering during A Season of Peace. Resources for A Season of Peace can be found at: presbyterianmission.org/seasonofpeace.
- Set dates with your session. Congregations commonly receive the Offering on World Communion Sunday (October 7).
- ♦ Commit to an ambitious giving goal—higher than the amount received last year—and discuss ideas for how to use your congregation's portion (25%).
- ♦ Locate and open the shipment of resource materials you received. Check out the outline of available resources on pages 22 and 23 for more tools to help with developing your interpretation plan.
- ♦ Contact Presbyterian Customer Service (800-533-4371 or customer\_service@presbypub.com) to order additional materials.
- ♦ Ask members to present Minutes for Mission from the pulpit. Distribute the corresponding bulletin inserts for additional impact.
- Consider sending a promotional email or letter to each person in your congregation. Be sure to include the link to the Peace & Global Witness Offering website (presbyterianmission.org/peace-global), so your members can learn more about the work supported by their gifts.
- Host an International Peacemaker this fall to help in your promotion. Visit pcusa.org/internationalpeacemakers to find out how.

- ❖ Involve your young people in promoting the Offering by having them choose a gift related to peacemaking and reconciliation from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog. Have them present it to the congregation along with how they think their gift will make a difference for others. For help, see page 9 for the Value for Values.
- Think about how you can integrate the worship resources into your service, emphasizing the ways our witness in the world magnifies our personal discipleship.
- ♦ Ask for suggestions from your youth and young adults about how to use the 25% kept by your congregation.

#### **DURING THE OFFERING**

#### **SEPTEMBER**

(Any time during the month)

- Use the PowerPoint slides in a worship service and/or other church gathering. Download it from presbyterianmission.org/peace-global.
- Display the Offering poster in a high traffic area of your church.
- Sign up for A Season of Peace, Path of Peace daily reflections.

#### **SEPTEMBER 2**

Remind congregants that today A Season of Peace begins. Instruct them how to sign up for the daily reflections delivered to their email (www.pcusa.org/subscribe — Path of Peace under Advocacy and Social Justice).

#### **SEPTEMBER 9**

- Place Offering Envelopes in the pews.
- ♦ Place a folded insert in your Sunday bulletin there are two of them.
- Present a Minute for Mission from this guide or reproduce one in your bulletin.
- Remind the congregation how its 25% share of the Offering will be used.

#### **SEPTEMBER 16**

- Place an Offering insert in your bulletin, or insert the brochure mailer in the bulletin if you have not already sent it to members of your congregation.
- Present a Minute for Mission from this guide or reproduce one in your bulletin.
- ♦ Share that the following Friday, September 21, is the *International Day of Peace* and also the beginning of the *Global Week of Action Against Gun Violence*.

#### **SEPTEMBER 23**

- Place a folded insert in your Sunday bulletin.
- ♦ Present a Minute for Mission from this guide or reproduce one in the bulletin.
- Remind your congregation how its 25% share of the Offering will be used for local peace efforts.

#### **SEPTEMBER 30**

- Place Offering envelopes in bulletins or pews for your congregation's use on World Communion Sunday and in the weeks to follow.
- Remind your congregation how it can make a difference in the community through its 25% share of the Offering, and encourage members to continue to contribute throughout the month.

#### **OCTOBER**

#### **OCTOBER 7**

- ♦ Use the worship resource for World Communion Sunday.
- ♦ If your youth sponsor a gift, have them present the gift during worship and share how it relates to peacemaking and to the congregation.
- Receive the Offering.

This five-week pilgrimage is designed to deepen the pursuit of peace for congregations, small groups, families, and individuals. This season is a time of encouragement, challenge, inspiration, and education. Presbyterians are invited to define and deepen their calling as peacemakers.

Available resources are designed to culminate in the Peace & Global Witness Offering, but are appropriate for any time of the year. This year's A Season of Peace resources are designed to help Presbyterians explore different forms and lenses for peacemaking. From the personal level to global issues like human trafficking and sustainable development, these reflections and prayers will help grow the faith and witness of the whole church. Through the days of this year's A Season of Peace, we are invited to reflect on:

- Peace that passes understanding: personal testimonies of faith and peace within self, within families, within communities
- Go and see: reflections from travel study seminar participants
- Partners in peace: interfaith work for peace and justice, building peace between us while witnessing to peace in our wider world
- The church and its witness: reflections on addressing trafficking in its varied forms
- Peacemaking and practice: stories and reflections on building bridges and crossing divides

#### RESOURCES INCLUDED IN A SEASON OF PEACE

#### Path of Peace Daily Reflections

Subscribe to daily reflections that will be delivered directly to your inbox from September 2 – October 7, or download the entire set of reflections as a single file (presbyterianmission.org/seasonofpeace — Path of Peace under Advocacy and Social Justice).

#### Peace Fair

The Peace Fair is a hands-on, multisensory, intergenerational event that offers peace and justice learning activities.

#### Peace Cards

There are 3 sets of 30 cards from which to choose. The cards can be placed in a central location such as a kitchen table. Peace Cards can be used anywhere and with anyone—at meals or family gatherings, during fellowship at church, as icebreakers for study groups, or for in-depth conversations on long bus rides with youth. Use one card per day during A Season of Peace and let the conversations lead to new perspectives and practices for making peace.

#### Children's Curriculum Lessons from the Table

is a five-session curriculum that focuses on the communion table. It can be used in a variety of contexts with children of various ages.

#### Adult Bible Study, The Things that Make for Peace

is a five-week adult study focusing on the inner and outer paths to peace as foundational to faithful discipleship. Each session has a "dig deeper" section for study throughout the week.

#### Adult Book Study

This five session guide helps participants explore, reflect upon, and apply the five peacemaking affirmations approved by the 222nd General Assembly in 2016. It is a companion to *Five Risks Presbyterians Must Take for Peace* by Christian Iosso, published in 2017 by Westminster John Knox Press.

#### Children's Coloring Poster

This reproducible, original artwork can be used as an individual coloring sheet or enlarged to poster-size for a group coloring project throughout the weeks of *A Season of Peace.* It was produced by Illustrated Children's Ministries.

#### PEACE AT ALL TIMES, IN ALL WAYS

Now may the Lord of peace... give you peace at all times in all ways.

— 2 Thessalonians 3:16

Sometimes it feels the world is coming at us so quickly that we don't know which way to turn, where to look, what to do next. In a chaotic world, we find strength in knowing that God is always near. Today, we are joining in Paul's prayer that God grant us "peace at all times, in all ways."

The Peace & Global Witness Offering our church supports provides the tools and resources for us as we join together as active peacemakers.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering draws Presbyterians together and provides education and exposure to those who show us how to do this work well. It allows us to create resources for dealing with conflict and nurturing reconciliation, and stand in support of our global sisters and brothers, because the peace of Christ belongs to people everywhere. It has helped support our church partners in Madagascar recover from years of destructive development. Scriptural resources helped congregations, like the one in Old Bergen, New Jersey, find common ground with neighbors of many faiths, bringing their children together to learn from one another and to build a peaceful future. And the whole church joins together, through this Offering, to work for an end to all forms of human trafficking, specifically, the sin of child soldiers.

As we work to share Christ's peace with one another, let's share that peace with those beyond our doors. Twenty-five percent of this Offering will go to our mid council, joining with other congregations in our

area to support peacemaking work in our region. The second 25 percent of this Offering stays

with our congregation, so that we can commit ourselves to active peacemaking.

## CONGREGATIONS NURTURE NEIGHBORLY CHILDREN ACROSS ETHNIC, RACIAL AND RELIGIOUS LINES

I'm sure you haven't forgotten that weekend in August 2016 when racially charged violence in Charlottesville, Virginia, sent shockwaves of fear and grief across our country. I know I haven't. Like you and me and many other Americans, Presbyterian pastor Jon Brown was distraught to the point of numbness. But on the following Monday morning, his hope was renewed, due to his church's participation in the Peace & Global Witness Offering.

His spirits were lifted by dozens of elementary-aged children who had gathered for Peace Camp at the congregation he serves, the Old Bergen Church in Jersey City, New Jersey. "To see children of different races, ethnicities, and faith traditions singing, laughing, and creating together was a powerful medicine for all of us in that moment," he says. The camp was sponsored by local Christian, Jewish, and Muslim congregations.

The children learned about ways to resolve conflicts and how to handle angry and sad feelings. They brainstormed about what is needed for a good neighborhood and built model neighborhoods out of cardboard boxes and other materials. They learned about the elements of a good neighborhood from resource people such as a police officer, librarian, teacher, and public health official.

The themes were adapted from a curriculum published with support from the Peace & Global Witness Offering. The curriculum, "Building a Neighborhood Together," draws a connection to *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood*, a PBS program created and hosted by the late Fred Rogers, a Presbyterian minister.

Brigid D'Souza, the parent of two campers and one of the camp's adult leaders, called it "a really important gift" to her children and other campers. "When I was growing up, I didn't attend Bible study camp or any kind of camp like that, so for me it was really informing to see what this type of camp could mean for kids," she says.

Across the U.S., Presbyterians are helping to build peaceful,



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neighborly communities. Many congregations and mid councils use gifts from the Peace & Global Witness Offering to put creative ideas like Peace Camp into action.

Twenty-five percent of this offering is retained by our congregation for local ministries of peacemaking and reconciliation (INCLUDING ... any past work of the congregation supported by past PGW offerings — pastor may personalize), another 25 percent will support these ministries at the mid council level, and the remaining 50 percent supports the peacemaking and reconciliation ministries of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A).

## STRIVING TO BRING AN END TO THE PLIGHT OF CHILD SOLDIERS

I want to tell you a story ... I wish it was just a story, but what I am about to share with you is sadly true. It is about a boy named Princeton—a happy, carefree, 13-year-old boy. Happy, that is, until the day he was snatched by soldiers and taken to a military training camp. Two weeks later, he was carrying a gun as a soldier in Nigeria's civil war. Can you even picture such a thing happening to a child that you know?

"I was going to fetch water for my mom when they grabbed me, and I didn't see my family again for two and a half years," he says. I wish this was only Princeton's story, but the reality is that children are forced to become soldiers every day in war-torn places around the world.

One hot, sunny afternoon, Princeton's unit came under heavy fire, and an unexploded rocket landed nearby. While he was attempting to defuse it, the rocket detonated. Princeton endured six surgeries without anesthesia over the next year and a half. Finally, at age 17—several long and terrible years later—he came home to his mother's arms.

His wartime experience wounded more than his body; it left him angry and rebellious. However, the peace of Christ worked in his life as he confessed his Christian faith for the first time. "My mom said God changed a heart of stone to a heart of flesh," Princeton says. Eventually, Princeton came to the U.S., and today he is pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Midlothian, Texas. He serves the whole church through national initiatives of Intercultural Ministries.

Princeton speaks from the heart when he says using child soldiers is "an evil that we need to exterminate, and we need to call attention to any system that supports this evil." Thanks to your gifts to the Peace & Global Witness Offering, we are doing just that.

Our participation in the Offering supports the Red Hand Campaign. Presbyterians across the country send prints or paper cutouts of red hands, along with



an accompanying note to the Presbyterian Ministry at the UN. The hands and a cover letter are then sent to countries that have yet to sign a UN protocol that forbids the use of child soldiers. Using a human-rights-based approach, we engage in anti-trafficking work related to forced labor and sex trafficking, in addition to our work to end the forced conscription of child soldiers.

Peace is active, not passive; peace is doing, not waiting. As we work to share Christ's peace with one another, let's share that peace with those beyond our doors. Twenty-five percent of the Peace & Global Witness Offering stays with our congregation to support peacemaking and reconciliation in our own community ("And this is what we do" ... pastor may personalize).

Another 25 percent will support these ministries at the mid council level, and the remaining 50 percent supports peacemaking and reconciliation ministries of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) such as the Red Hand Campaign. Your gifts will help more people experience the freedom and dignity that Christ wants for everyone. Please think about Princeton, and so many others like him, and give generously. Let us offer the peace of Christ at all times and in all ways.

#### **BUILDING PEACE IN MADAGASCAR**

Blessed are the peacemakers! The Peace & Global Witness Offering unites our church with Presbyterians everywhere reaching out to people across the globe who long for peace and reconciliation. Shaping a foundation for peace starts with honest conversations and shared experiences. When we share, we carry each other's burdens, advocate for one another, and share each other's hopes. Some US Presbyterians and our church partners in Madagascar shared just such an experience this past year through a travel study seminar.

Madagascar is an island nation 250 miles off Africa's east coast. Due in part to years of unsustainable development practices and government instability, the Malagasy people suffer from poverty and malnutrition.

Despite this, the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar's efforts to alleviate hunger and promote democracy offered much hope to celebrate. "The church there is so alive—it is active and caring, and they encouraged us to be more faithful," says Lucy Janjigian (say JAN-JIG-IAN), of Los Altos, California.

At Ivato (say EE-VA-TO) Seminary, student Ravo Vonialisoa. (say RA-VO VON-E-AH-LEE-SO-A) shared that her goal in ministry is to "bring new ideas and new life to the churches I serve and a new life to the nation." Her resolve was strengthened by her Presbyterian visitors.

"I realize now that the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar is not alone. I will share this with the churches I serve so they know that there are many churches around the world praying for us," she says. "I feel a greater connection to the worldwide church."

Seminar participants were captivated by the agricultural, educational, and healthcare ministries that our partner church and our mission co-workers do together. They clearly saw the Malagasy church's struggle for human rights and democracy. Now these witnesses are calling on us to deepen our commitment to active peacemaking, through advocacy efforts to



end extractive development practices and promote democracy and respect for human rights.

Half of the offering is used by the national church to witness for peace in Madagascar and other troubled places around the world. Twenty five percent is retained by our congregation for local ministries of peacemaking, and another 25 percent is used by mid councils for these ministries on the regional level.

I end this minute for mission by reminding you of where we started — *Blessed are the peacemakers*. Please give generously.

God of all people, we give thanks for vibrant, growing churches like the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar.

Bless them as they work for a more just and peaceful country.

May we see that the struggles of brothers and sisters around the world are also our struggles.

## BEYOND OUR DOORS, BEYOND OUR COMMUNITY, BEYOND OUR BORDERS


Peace is active, not passive; peace is doing, not waiting.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering connects congregations around the country with inspiring and innovative peacemakers from partner churches around the globe so they may learn from one another. The Offering helps develop educational resources that illustrate how congregations can become active peacemakers both in our local community and around the world. It also offers all Presbyterians and congregations access to the halls of power to lift up the needs of our sisters and brothers in Christ in every corner of the world through our ministries in Washington D.C. and the United Nations.

Being active peacemakers connects our challenges here at home to global challenges which are often similar at their core. For example, RECONCILE (the Resource Centre for Civil Leadership) in South Sudan, an initiative originating in that war-torn country, seeks peace among people by building relationships between those who would be enemies to create pathways for a civil society to flourish in the future.

These actions are mirrored by Webster Presbyterian Church in Texas. Webster supports the Institute for Civility in Government which creates experiences for youth and young adults that model productive and civil engagement between people of differing political commitments. This was echoed by Druid Hills Presbyterian Church in Georgia as they focused on the connections between the three Abrahamic faiths (Islam, Christianity and Judaism) in response to their discomfort over anti-immigrant, and particularly, anti-Muslim sentiments.

Another challenge is domestic abuse. Many congregations (including ours... if appropriate) support shelters for abused women and children in their communities — but domestic abuse is far from being just a local issue. The PC(USA) has mission personnel around the world dedicated to reducing domestic abuse. The Peacemaking Program has taken



delegations to Guatemala to witness this work in order to learn from our partners there and share their stories of success in battling this scourge.

Peace is active, not passive; peace is doing, not waiting.

Sometimes it feels the world is coming at us so quickly that we don't know which way to turn, where to look, what to do next. But there is much we can do. As we seek peace in a chaotic world, we find strength in knowing that God is always near. As we move forward as active peacemakers beyond the doors of this church, God is near. Beyond the limits of this (city/town) and across borders that may feel very distant, God is near. God is near to those in need who make who make their homes among us and those who live in places we may only see on the evening news.

Let us pray ~

Draw near to us, Oh God, and to all those who crave your peace.

As we join, anew, your reconciling ministry in the world, nourish us by your Spirit to be active, engaged and committed peacemakers, joyfully engaging with one another for the sake of your most vulnerable children.

In the peace of Christ, at all times, in all ways,

Amen.



**Plan a community event** to celebrate the life of a notable peacemaker. You can choose a past or present public figure, or make it even more personal and meaningful by highlighting a member of your congregation or community. Choose a theme such as gun violence, poverty, racism, immigration, or nonviolence. Partner with other faith communities and community groups. Organize a walk to significant community locations.

Create a "peace prayer" display. Postings can include joys and concerns, prayers, and pictures of people and places in need. Include the joys and concerns in worship services and encourage your members to include the them in their daily prayers.






Increase awareness and efforts to combat human trafficking.
