THE PENTECOST OFFERING HELPS OUR YOUTH BEGIN LIFE WITH A STRONG START—A SOLID FOUNDATION OF FAITH FORMED IN THE FIRST THIRD OF LIFE, FROM CHILDHOOD THROUGH YOUNG ADULTHOOD.

Each year on Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us still, connecting us with *the church of the past*, continuing to inspire *the church of today*, and pointing us to *the church of the future*. Each year, this celebration is marked by receiving the Pentecost Offering which nurtures the faith of those who are the church to come — children, youth, and young adults.

Psalm 71 testifies that a foundation of faith established during childhood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life. By giving to the Pentecost Offering, your congregation participates in helping our children, youth, and young adults grow up to proclaim with the Psalmist, "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds."

QUICK FACTS

- Congregations keep 40% of raised funds to initiate or support programs for young people in their communities.
- The first Presbyterian Youth Triennium was held in 1980.
- The Day of Pentecost is referred to as the birthday of the Church.
- Pentecost is usually represented with the color red, which symbolizes the fire of the Holy Spirit.

Since the Pentecost Offering started in 1998, Presbyterians have raised more than \$15 million for ministries that benefit younger members of God's family. We believe we are called to do even more — to support and care for young people as they build a strong foundation of faith.

YOUR GIFTS AT WORK

Congregational Initiatives with Young People

40% of the Pentecost Offering remains with your congregation to support ministries with children and youth in your church and local community. Churches have used these funds to:

Run an affordable day care for young teen mothers to enable them to complete their education.

Identify and train local leaders for participation in the *"Educate a Child: Transform the World"* national initiative.

Conduct workshops and presentations, and develop resources to end child sex and labor trafficking.

Help promote the National Observance of Children's Sabbaths.

Create web and print resources to address systemic issues that impact children, such as poverty, health, and consumerism.

Initiate local, afterschool or summer programs for latchkey children.

Serving Communities (Young Adult Volunteers)

25% goes to **Young Adult Volunteer** (YAV) experience. Your gifts to the Offering have helped this ministry area to:

Train and equip volunteers to engage in mission at more than 20 sites in the U.S. and around the world.

Reduce barriers to serve by providing assistance with student loan debt, medical insurance, and a simple living stipend.

Provide additional funding to ensure all young adults have the opportunity to participate.

Provide funds for retreats, orientation events, and counseling to help YAVs discern God's call.

Guiding Youth (Youth Ministries)

25% supports **ministries with youth**, ages 12–18, and those called to accompany them. Your gifts to the Offering helped this ministry area to:

Fund the design of a new Christian Formation endeavor called *The Senior Project*. This project

offers a path and plan for graduating seniors to explore their next steps in faith, community, and vocation.

10% supports the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative, which was affirmed at the 221st General Assembly (2014). The goal of this initiative is to motivate and inspire Presbyterians to better the lives of one million children by 2020.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

IDEAS FROM OUR CONGREGATIONS

Inspire your congregation to give by sharing some of the ways other churches have used their 40% of the Pentecost Offering on behalf of children, youth, and young adults in their communities:

Assisting the Families of Children at Risk

Providing financial support to local homeless shelters.

Supporting a program that pairs children with disabilities such as autism with children who do not, where strengths are celebrated and differences are accepted.

Creating, promoting, and expanding services for grandparents and other relatives who have taken on the responsibility of surrogate parenting due to the absence of parents.

Supporting Education for At-Risk Youth

Providing vouchers for new school shoes.

Collecting and providing school supplies.

Providing training for volunteers for the Child and Youth Protection Policy.

Growing Mission Work with Youth and Young Adults

Contributing to the congregation's own children and youth fund.

Supporting college outreach ministries.

Providing scholarships to summer camps.

Supporting the Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) program within the local presbytery.

Ministering to Children and At-Risk Teens

Contributing and volunteering at an affordable day care ministry for teen parents.

Contributing to a school backpack program so low-income children get the nutritious foods they need when school is not in session. Supporting a program that builds the self-esteem of black, male, teens through education and service.

Providing guidance for teenage girls through a program that teaches health, exercise, nutrition, self-esteem and offers a safe place to discuss issues affecting young girls.

Contributing to a center for children of abused spouses.

Providing a weekly Wednesday night meal free of charge.

Offering funds to an anti-bullying program at the local elementary school.

Providing for Health and Safety

Providing assistance to teen pregnancy resource centers.

Supporting or creating a program that packages nutritious, life-saving meals for starving or malnourished children and their families in developing countries and the United States.

Contributing funds to programs that improve the lives of foster children with school supplies, toys, and a suitcase so they don't have to travel from home to home with their belongings in a trash bag.

3 PROMOTING THE OFFERING BEFORE THE OFFERING

PLAN

Life is easier when a plan is in place. If you make arrangements ahead of time, promotion will go more smoothly, and you'll make the most of every opportunity to motivate your congregation to share and support the Pentecost Offering.

- Set dates with your session. Congregations commonly receive the Offering on Pentecost Sunday (June 9) or other youth-focused Sundays (such as Youth in the Church and World on August 18), or during Vacation Bible School.
- Commit to a goal with the session—one higher than the total raised last year—and discuss ideas on how to use your congregation's portion (40%).
- Contact Presbyterian Customer Service 800-533-4371 or customer_service@presbypub.com to order any additional materials you may need.
- Locate and open the shipment of materials you received. Display the Pentecost poster in a prominent place within your church. Find other tools to help with developing your interpretation plan by reviewing the outline of available resources on page 16.
- Share "Ways to Involve Children and Youth" with your Christian education and worship committees. Learn more at presbyterianmission.org/pentecost
- Ask young people to present Minutes for Mission from the pulpit. Note the bulletins feature unique messages that expand on specific Minutes for Mission (pages 11-15, feel free to pair as you like). Minutes for Mission can also be downloaded at presbyterianmission.org/pentecost
- Ask your pastor about sending a promotional email or letter to each person in your congregation (there is a sample pastor letter online). Be sure to include the link to the Pentecost Offering website (presbyterianmission.org/pentecost), so your members can learn more about the work supported by their gifts.
- Use the curriculum from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog to get people involved and to give examples of how the Mission Agency uses some of its funds. specialofferings.pcusa.org/pgcdownload

BE CREATIVE

Though we've laid out a plan for you, your creativity and voice is an important part of this process. We'll never know your congregation the way you do. What kind of activities do they love?

- Ask for suggestions from the youth and young adults in your congregation about how to use the 40% kept by your congregation.
- Think about how you can integrate the worship resources into your service holistically rather than treating them as add-ons. Doing this emphasizes the role our witness in the world plays in our own discipleship.
- Create a plan for involving children and youth in promoting the Offering through a skit or other worship activity. One option is having your youth choose one of the Pentecost-supported gifts from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog to sponsor, and present it to the congregation along with how they think their gift will make a difference for others.

4 DURING THE OFFERING

PLAN

- Hang the Offering poster in a prominent location, if you have not already created a display.
- Place a folded insert in the Sunday bulletin every week. There are two inserts Building A Life of Faith and Changes for a Lifetime — this year. Feel free to use the same bulletin for multiple weeks if you are promoting all month.
- Put Offering envelopes in pew racks every week.
- Present Minutes for Mission, and encourage your members to give generously, with reminders of the goal you set with the session.
- ◆ Use the worship resources found on our website, including a set of customizable PowerPoint[™] slides, and focus on the Offering in a sermon.
- Involve children and youth—ask them to hand out bulletin inserts as an alternative to placing them in pews.
- Promote the Offering on your church's Facebook page with the Pentecost cover photo.
- + Use the provided art, graphics, and content in your church newsletter, blog, or website.
- Send a letter to your congregation from the pastor (a customizable letter can be found online). This provides members who might have missed the Offering collection a chance to support the ministry. Be sure to include the link to the Pentecost Offering website (presbyterianmission.org/pentecost), so members can learn more about the work supported by their gifts.
- Ask your pastor about sending a reminder email or letter to each person in your congregation, encouraging generous support. (Surveys show this makes a significant difference in congregant giving.)



AFTER THE OFFERING

- Thank your congregation for their generous gifts and share the total raised. Celebrate meeting or exceeding your original goal! Remind them of the causes they have supported: Ministries with Youth, Young Adult Volunteers, and advocacy and education for children at risk.
- Keep 40% of the Offering for your congregation's use on behalf of local, youth-focused ministries and programs. See page 5 for ideas, and share how the retained portion will be used.
- Send in the remaining 60% as your congregation's offering. At the direction of the 220th General Assembly (2012), congregations are encouraged to remit Pentecost gifts directly to the Presbyterian Mission Agency, with "Pentecost Offering" on the memo line.

THE PENTECOST OFFERING—BUILDING A LIFE OF FAITH



Who was the first person to teach you about Jesus? Who was the first person to show you how to honor God with your life? Who helped you open the doors to new understandings of God and of faith? When did these things happen? For many of us, they happened during our childhood. They happened at home, at Sunday School, at church, at camp, or, perhaps through mission trips or experiences of service.

We probably don't need a study to tell us that a foundation of faith established during childhood through young adulthood, the first third of life, helps ensure lifelong faith and service — but yet studies do show this to be true. Psalm 71 testifies to this same truth. Verse 17 says "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds." The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life.

That's why our congregation joins in support of the Pentecost Offering. This churchwide offering opens the doors to children, youth, and young adults so that they grow in the patterns of faith meant to last a lifetime. When we give, congregations join in shaping the education provided at public schools, through the *Educate a Child, Transform the World* national initiative. As Presbyterians, we believe that every child deserves access to high-quality education. When we give, young adults engage in a year of service while discerning how best to love God and neighbor, through the Young Adult Volunteer program. As Presbyterians, we believe that serving others is more than just something good to do, it's something that teaches us about God and about ourselves.

When we give, more than 5,000 youth gather at the Presbyterian Youth Triennium to worship, learn, and serve together. As Presbyterians, we believe that the Holy Spirit moves among us when we gather together and draws us into meaningful relationships and powerful understandings of what God is doing in the world.

During Pentecost, we celebrate that the Holy Spirit has opened the doors to faith in Jesus Christ. SURPRISED BY THE SPIRIT IN NEW ORLEANS



Can there be any more inspirational words to hear from a young person these? "The Holy Spirit took me, and changed me in ways that I wasn't expecting."

During Pentecost, we celebrate that the Holy Spirit has opened the doors to faith in Jesus Christ. While serving as a Presbyterian Young Adult Volunteer, or "YAVs" as you often hear us call them, Cherokee Adams was changed in ways she wasn't expecting.

As a program assistant at Eden House in New Orleans, Cherokee encountered human trafficking survivors seeking a new start in life. Most struggled with a past that includes social ostracism, brushes with the law, and drug addiction. Yet her relationships with the women taught her that each person comes with a unique story. As Cherokee said, "They are someone's mom; they are someone's sister; they are someone's cousin; they are someone's grandma."

And Cherokee came to see them as something ... else. Something ... more. She experienced them as vessels of grace.

"The women of Eden House spoke truth to me through love and the healing power of grace and humanity," Cherokee says. shaping her. "It was kind of like the Pentecost story," she explains. "The Holy Spirit took me and changed me in ways that I wasn't expecting." That's so beautiful, isn't it? And not altogether uncommon. Many YAVs tell us that they come away from the experience with a new realization of what their faith truly means.

Cherokee is grateful for the Presbyterians who provide financial support for the YAV program — a year-long program for people between 19 and 30. "Thanks to these gifts, young people like me can be shaped and changed into better, more socially aware individuals and be affected by the places we serve and the people we meet."

This churchwide offering opens the doors to children, youth, and young adults so that they grow in the patterns of faith meant to last a lifetime. It gives them a first-hand experience with the difference we can make when we walk through our doors to share Christ's love. Congregations like ours keep forty percent of the Offering to make an impact of young people lives not just YAV, but also children at risk who need us, children who are right here in our community. In the past, we have used the Pentecost Offering to support (PROGRAM/MINISTRY). Please give generously. When we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

Holy Spirit, change us in ways that we do not expect, through relationships with those in need, and by the example we see in our young adult volunteers. Amen.

MESSAGES OF FAITH, WRITTEN ON THE HEART



In an age when fleeting social media messages saturate the lives of teens, Kylie Carlson treasures the lasting impact of some powerful words scrawled on tiny slips of paper.

For three years, she has kept the messages that were stashed in her "Compliment Bag" by at the 2016 Presbyterian Youth Triennium. They were put there by members of her small group, and the affirmations range from casual to positively transformational.

One member wrote to Kylie, "You are a good public speaker." These simple words, shared just after the author had heard her speak, were particularly significant for her because Kylie, like many people, was fearful of public speaking.

"It stuck with me," Kylie says. It helped her gain confidence, and today she considers herself more than proficient when she stands before audiences to speak.

While these affirmations written on paper were meaningful for Kylie, even more significant for her were the messages of faith that were written on her heart. Kylie had completed confirmation classes at her congregation, First Presbyterian Church in Britton, South Dakota, not long before her youth group attended Triennium. Both events were significant spiritual milestones, Kylie says.

"Before confirmation, it was like you went to church because your parents did, but now we have a more personal connection with faith," she explained. "Then we went to Triennium, it became even more personal. It was amazing to see all the people who were there sharing the same faith as I did and felt the same way about it as I did. We were really able to have more in-depth, personal conversations about our faith," she says. Isn't it wonderful for a person at such a young age to come to understand the meaning and value of being a connected church? This is something that she, and thousands of other youth who attend Triennium, will never forget.

CALIFORNIA CONGREGATION'S AFTER-SCHOOL MINISTRY ENABLES STUDENTS TO TRANSCEND POVERTY





Christopher Hall's life was not always smooth sailing, but it could have turned out very different had he not been boosted by a Rising TIDE.

Rising TIDE, which stands for "Train Individuals to Develop and Excel," is an after-school ministry of Covenant Presbyterian Church in Long Beach, California. Christopher, who was born into poverty in a depressed city neighborhood, is now a successful entrepreneur, a husband and a father of three.

But if not for Rising Tide, he says life might have been much different for him and many of his friends.

"Rising TIDE helps you become something better. We could easily have become gang members or been involved in alcohol, drugs or other negative things."

Rising TIDE serves children and youth from pre-school through high school with everything from tutoring and enrichment opportunities to sports and physical fitness activities to life skills training. However, Rising TIDE is about more than programming for the 100 students whom it serves. It's also about building relationships.

"Those who come from helpful and supportive families experience the Rising TIDE family as a supplementary family," says Rev. Rob Langworthy, who co-founded Rising TIDE with his wife, Rev. Adele Langworthy. "Others who don't have that kind of family at home find Rising TIDE as their source of support and inspiration and guidance and encouragement." Rob notes the program has its best success among students who began the program in childhood and continue through adolescence. "Well over 90 percent of those who are involved in the program for several years go on to college or university," Rob says. "We have a lot of success stories of people who have achieved in life beyond what a lot of people might have expected."

Across the United States and around the world, the Pentecost Offering helps young people achieve their God-given potential. Children at risk, ministries with youth and Young Adult Volunteers benefit from Pentecost Offering gifts. And forty percent of the offering stays right here with us, to support our own (PROGRAMS/MINISTRIES).

Through the Pentecost Offering, we make an impact on young people right here in our own church, our own community—as well in other churches and other communities whose children need our love. And perhaps most importantly, this churchwide offering opens the doors to children, youth, and young adults so that they grow in the patterns of faith meant to last a lifetime. Please give generously, because as has always been the case, when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

Let us pray ~ Lift our eyes, O God, to see the potential of every one of your children. May we reach out and support those who are at risk so that their futures rise like the tides of your seas. Amen

I bet some of you remember that song from the 1980s. It is called "The Greatest Love of All." And what greater love is there than God's love for the children?

The chorus in that song goes "the greatest love of all Is happening to me. I found the greatest love of all inside of me."

While serving as a Presbyterian Young Adult Volunteer, Cherokee Adams experienced the greatest love of all. She said that during her service, "the Holy Spirit took me and changed me in ways I wasn't expecting." Now Cherokee hopes to go to seminary and be a pastor. She wants to share the greatest love of all, God's love, as it was shared with her, with as many people as she can touch.

It is so important that we support young people like Cherokee because a foundation of faith established during childhood through young adulthood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The programs we support through the Pentecost Offering helps our youth church of the future — to embrace the true meaning of God's love in their own lives. Perhaps Kylie, a young woman from South Dakota, said it best when recalling her own experience at the Presbyterian Youth Triennium.

"Before confirmation, it was like you went to church because your parents did, but now we have a more personal connection with faith," she explained. "Then we went to Triennium, it became even more personal. It was amazing to see all the people who were there sharing the same faith as I did and felt the same way about it as I did."

The Pentecost Offering is also dedicated to helping children at-risk. One such program is Rising TIDE, an after-school ministry of Covenant Presbyterian Church in Long Beach, California.

"Those who come from helpful and supportive families experience the Rising TIDE family as a supplementary family," says Rev. Rob Langworthy, who co-founded Rising TIDE with his wife, Rev. Adele Langworthy. "Others who don't have that kind of family at home find Rising TIDE as their source of support and inspiration and guidance and encouragement."

Forty percent of the Pentecost Offering stays right here in our own church so we can provide support, inspiration, guidance and encouragement as well — whether it is with programs like our own (ADD YOUR OWN STORY) or by providing the means to support our youth's participation in the upcoming Triennium.

Bottom line, through our gifts to the Pentecost Offering we are sharing the greatest love of all—God's love. And what better gift could we possibly give our children than the gift of faith, and love, to last a lifetime?




