Resources and Activities

Today's families come in all sizes, shapes, colors, and forms, yet there are those who do not welcome families that look different from the traditional mother-father-children family model. Both the parents and the children in families who experience hurtful comments or who are not welcomed by neighbors, for instance, need support in weathering negativity that may come their way. God made each and every one of us a beloved child of God, no matter who or how we love. The activities and resources that follow are for families and churches to use in helping to acknowledge the beloved-ness of everyone in God's eyes, particularly LGBTQIA+ children and families.

- Ask:
 - I wonder who "they" might be... I wonder if it is hard to call someone "they"... I wonder why someone would want to be called "they"... Add your own wonderings.

- > Attend a Pride event or parade as a family and/or with your church.
 - Wear rainbow clothing, carry rainbow flags and banners (make your own!),
 - Hand out rainbow stickers/tattoos like <u>these</u> from Vibrant Church Communications <u>https://vibrantchurchcommunications.com/beloved</u> or <u>these</u> from Illustrated Ministry <u>https://store.illustratedministry.com/collections/illustrated-cards-stickers/products/you-are-lovedstickers</u>. What else might you do with these stickers? Why the rainbow? With its variety of colors all blending together in a spectrum, it is the perfect symbol to represent the vast diversity as well as the sense of unity within the LGBTQIA+ community.

- Create pride rainbow art on the sidewalk with sidewalk chalk, or on your windows with dry ease markers, or make rainbow bracelets with beads and/or embroidery floss. You can also make rainbow friendship rocks, piñatas, and leaf prints. The rainbow possibilities are endless! Give them away or make a display in your home or at church with friends.
- > Show your colors by putting up a flag or putting out a yard sign.
- **Bake** a rainbow cake and read a story.
- Advocate by finding and partnering with a community organization on an ongoing basis. For example, a church partnered with a local teen organization and provided treats and needed supplies. Or as a family write public figures or support librarians.

Here are 4 selected books on sexual or gender identity and friendship for young children:

- *And Tango Makes Three* by Justin Richardson and Peter Parnell This story is based on what happened with a real penguin family in Central Park Zoo in New York City. For ages 4 and up.
- *Introducing Teddy: A Gentle Story About Gender and Friendship* by Jessica Walton A story about being a good friend as well as being true to yourself, with age-appropriate language and images relating to gender equality. For ages 3-6.
- *Old Turtle* by Douglas Wood Who in the animal kingdom has the right idea about what God is like? A beautiful story simply told that appeals to all ages.
- *Red: A Crayon's Story* by Michael Hall A blue crayon is labelled as red and tries to meet others' expectations without much success. A story about being true to your inner self. For ages 4-8.
