## Act of Remembrance

This act of remembrance is appropriate for an interfaith memorial observance. It may also be used on All Saints' Day, along with other prayers and readings from the Scriptures.

Ring a handbell three times, slowly.

Then, after a brief silence, read:

No person is an island, entire of itself. Each is a piece of the continent, a part of the main.

With thanksgiving, we remember ...

Slowly and contemplatively read the names of those who have died.

After each person's name is read, someone lights a candle; then ring the bell once. Be sure not to rush, and to allow time for silent reflection.

*After all the names are read and candles are lighted, continue reading:* 

Each person's death diminishes me, for I am involved in humankind. Therefore, ask not for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for you.

Ring the handbell three more times, slowly.

Then after a brief silence, the reading concludes:

Death: be not proud, though some have called you mighty and dreadful, yet you are not so, for those whom you think you can overthrow die not, poor death — nor yet can you kill me.

One short sleep past, we wake eternally, and death shall be no more; death, you will die.
