The Mission Work Plan of the General Assembly Council The August 2007 Survey

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OVERVIEW

What Is the Presbyterian Panel?

The Presbyterian Panel consists of three nationally representative samples of groups affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.): members, elders (lay leaders) currently on session, and ordained ministers. (The session is the governing body in Presbyterian congregations.) For analysis, ministers are split into two groups based on current call: *pastors*, serving congregations, and *specialized clergy*, serving elsewhere. New samples are drawn every three years. Panel surveys are conducted quarterly, primarily by mail, but with an online completion option.

Findings from each survey are published in two forms—a four-page summary and a more detailed report. The Panel is administered by the office of Research Services of the General Assembly Mission Council of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The first Panel was created in 1973 to provide a means for informing leaders of the opinions and activities of the rank and file across the church. Survey topics and questions are usually developed at the request of, and in consultation with, staff or elected members of national church entities. However, ultimate decisions on content of Panel surveys and the disposition of Panel data are those of Research Services. Standards developed by the American Association of Public Opinion Research guide Panel surveys.

Current Survey

The current survey is the seventh completed by the 2006-2008 Panel. Questionnaires were mailed on August 20, 2007, with returns accepted through mid-October 2007. Most panelists received a copy by U.S. mail, but a subset (n = 494, or 14%) who had signed up for the service was notified via email. Non-respondents were sent a postcard reminder on September 10, 2007. All panelists could complete the survey on the Web, and the percentages of respondents who did so are: members, 19%; elders, 18%; pastors, 31%; specialized clergy, 33%. Response rates for this survey are: members, 35%; elders, 45%; ministers, 51%.

Sponsor and Topic

The survey was requested by the General Assembly Council (it became the General Assembly Mission Council in June 2009) to obtain broad input on its priorities for mission for the 2009-2012 period. To develop the questions, Panel staff worked with Curtis Kearns, Executive Administrator in the GAMC Executive Director's Office, and a subcommittee of the GAMC itself. Report Format

The first half of this report uses text and graphics to summarize and explicate findings. A data appendix follows with comparative tables that display the percentage distribution of responses to every question for each of the four Panel groups. Results are subject to sampling and other errors. In general, differences of less than 8% are not statistically meaningful.

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HIGHLIGHTS

- ✓ Most members, elders, and specialized clergy, and almost half of pastors, are "not at all familiar" with the 2007-2008 Mission Work Plan of the General Assembly Council. Many others are "not too familiar." (p. 1)
- ✓ Of ten types of ministry listed in the Evangelism and Witness goal area, large majorities of all Panel groups (three-fourths or more) rate "developing vibrant, healthy congregations" as a "very great" or "great" need in the PC(USA). Slightly smaller majorities (60% or more) also rate as "very great" or "great" needs "helping people invite others into the life of Christ"; "helping equip presbyteries, congregations, and individuals to share the good news of the gospel with those who have no church affiliation"; and "finding ways of bringing people into community." (p. 2)
- ✓ Asked to choose the most and second most important Evangelism and Witness ministry needs from the same list of ten, the largest number of panelists (around four in ten in every group) select "developing vibrant, healthy congregations." (p. 3)
- ✓ Of ten types of ministry listed in the Justice and Compassion goal area, half or more rate as "very great" or "great" needs: "preserving the environment as God's creation"; "increasing awareness of non-violent options for conflict resolution"; "encouraging and supporting efforts to address the underlying causes of poverty"; and "supporting emergency relief operations." (p. 4)
- ✓ Asked to choose the most and second most important Justice and Compassion ministry needs from the same list of ten, the largest number of members, elders, and pastors (around one-third of the laity, 43% of pastors) select "supporting emergency relief operations," while the largest number of specialized clergy (one-third) select "providing opportunities for people to be involved in ministries of compassion and justice." (p. 5)
- ✓ Of 16 types of ministry listed in the Leadership and Vocation goal area, the largest share in every Panel group (six in ten or more) rates as a "very great" or "great" need "attracting competent and highly motivated church professionals," with only slightly fewer in every group (around half or more) similarly rating "helping congregations find pastoral leadership," "helping members understand that their vocation is from God," "helping small congregations," and "providing support and coaching for church professionals." (p. 6)
- ✓ Asked to choose the most and second most important Leadership and Vocation ministry needs from the same list of 16, the largest numbers of members, elders, and specialized clergy (around one-fourth) select "attracting competent and highly motivated church professionals," while the largest share of pastors (one-fourth) select "helping members understand that their vocation is from God." (p. 7)
- ✓ Of 12 types of ministry listed in the Spirituality and Discipleship goal area, the largest share in every Panel group (two-thirds or more) rates as a "very great" or "great" need "reaching college students and young adults." Majorities of 59% or more also similarly rate "helping families of all types to identify and resist the destructive pressures and temptations in society" and "strengthening Christian education." (p. 8)
- ✓ Asked to choose the most and second most important Spirituality and Discipleship ministry needs from the same list of 12, the largest number in every group (ranging from 27% to 40%) select "helping families of all types to identify and resist the destructive pressures and temptations in society." (p. 9)
- ✓ In general, ministry needs in the Evangelism and Witness goal area receive the highest ratings by all Panel groups, particularly pastors. The needs in Leadership and Vocation receive the lowest ratings. (p. 10)
- ✓ Needs receiving relatively low ratings include those that: specifically mention Presbyterians; concern discernment; and concern multicultural, racial-ethnic, under-represented, or immigrant populations. (p. 10)
- ✓ Most panelists prefer that the PC(USA) evenly split its mission efforts between the United States and overseas. Among the rest, most would tip the balance toward more mission in the United States. (p. 12)

INTRODUCTION

Background Information Provided to Panelists

✓ To ensure that all panelists had some basic knowledge of the General Assembly Council, the following description was provided at the start of the questionnaire:

The **General Assembly Council**, or **GAC**, is an elected body of 48 individuals that oversees most of the national and international ministries of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The General Assembly Council staff, most of whom work in Louisville or in mission abroad, carry out its ministries and programs—including duties assigned to the General Assembly Council by the General Assembly. To guide the overall work of these staff persons, the General Assembly Council has adopted a Mission Work Plan.


✓ Most questions ask panelists to report, for each of four goal areas in the Mission Work Plan, the degree of need in the PC(USA) for several specific tasks or emphases. The exact instructions to panelists for these questions follow:

The General Assembly Council seeks to identify the most important church needs in each priority goal area. Once determined, these needs will guide the Council and its staff in their work with individuals, congregations, and middle governing bodies. To help identify and prioritize church needs, the Council seeks your opinions. Below are lists in each priority goal area of possible needs that have been suggested to the Council. For each one, indicate how great you believe the need is in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), if any, for ministry of this type.

Degree of Familiarity with the 2007-2008 Mission Work Plan

- ✓ The first question inquired, "how familiar are you with the General Assembly Council's 2007-2008 Mission Work Plan?" Majorities of members (71%), elders (63%), and specialized clergy (55%), and almost half of pastors (48%), are "not at all familiar" with the 2007-2008 Mission Work Plan of the General Assembly Council. Many others are "not too familiar" (18%; 21%; 21%; 23%).
- ✓ Panelists with some familiarity with the Mission Work Plan were asked their awareness of the four goal areas in the plan. (See Figure 1, where responses to this question and the previous one on familiarity have been combined for members and pastors.) In every group, majorities in this subset are "aware" or "very aware" of the four goal areas:
 - Evangelism and Witness—members, 71%; elders, 64%; pastors, 80%; specialized clergy, 84%.
 - Justice and Compassion—57%; 59%; 78%; 87%.
 - Leadership and Vocation—57%; 56%; 74%; 79%.
 - Spirituality and Discipleship—80%; 61%; 72%; 81%.

EVANGELISM AND WITNESS

PC(USA) Needs in the Evangelism and Witness Goal Area: Ratings

✓ Asked the need in the PC(USA) for each of ten Evangelism and Witness ministries, the response totals for "very great" and "great" vary widely by Panel group. The percentages so responding are presented in Table 1, sorted from highest to lowest based on members' responses.

- ✓ In all Panel groups, the largest total for "very great" or "great" need is for "developing vibrant, healthy congregations" (members, 78%; elders, 82%; pastors, 91%; specialized clergy, 81%).
- ✓ Half or more in all groups also rate as "very great" or "great" needs: "helping people invite others into the life of Christ" (members, 66%; elders, 72%; pastors, 83%; specialized clergy, 64%); "helping equip presbyteries, congregations, and individuals to share the good news of the gospel with those who have no church affiliation" (59%; 76%; 63%); "finding ways of bringing people into community" (58%; 65%; 75%; 66%); "helping members see that they have a call from God to Christian witness in society and the church" (51%; 59%; 76%; 73%); and "helping people become more comfortable with articulating their own faith story" (51%, 58%, 80%, 67%).
- ✓ In general, fewer lay than clergy panelists rate each ministry as a "very great" or "great" need, with gaps of more than 25% between members' and pastors' ratings for three ministries: "supporting new congregations in the United States that reach out to immigrant populations" (members, 33%; pastors, 63%); "helping people become more comfortable with articulating their own faith story" (51%; 80%); and "helping members see that they have a call from God to Christian witness in society and the church" (51%; 76%).
- ✓ Pastors' ratings are the highest in all but two comparisons, where specialized clergy have the highest total for "very great" or "great" need: "supporting efforts to develop congregations that reflect the multicultural makeup of our society" (pastors, 49%; specialized clergy, 58%) and "helping people communicate what being Presbyterian 'is all about'" (45%; 53%).

EVANGELISM AND WITNESS

PC(USA) Needs in the Evangelism and Witness Goal Area: Rankings

✓ Asked to identify the most and second most important needs in the PC(USA) from the same list of ten ministries discussed on the previous page, the combined rankings (ordered from highest to lowest based on members' responses) for the Evangelism and Witness goal area are presented in Table 2. None of the Panel groups rank all of these needs identically, though members and elders share the same top five.

- ✓ At least four in ten panelists in every group (members, 46%; elders, 42%; pastors, 46%; specialized clergy, 40%) rank "developing vibrant, healthy congregations" as either the most or second most important need in the Evangelism and Witness goal area, a finding consistent with the ratings (see Table 1).
- ✓ Next among members and elders is "helping equip presbyteries, congregations, and individuals to share the good news of the gospel with those who have no church affiliation," ranked as either the most or second most important need by 26% and 30%, respectively.
- ✓ Next among pastors and specialized clergy is "helping people invite others into the life of Christ," ranked as either the most or second most important need by 36% and 23%, respectively.
- ✓ Also ranked relatively high in all groups are: "finding ways of bringing people into community" (members, 25%; elders, 25%; pastors, 17%; specialized clergy, 22%); "helping members see they have a call from God to Christian witness in society and church" (23%; 20%; 22%; 22%); and "helping people become more comfortable with articulating their own faith story" (17%; 17%; 22%; 21%).
- ✓ Ranked at the bottom in all groups is "supporting new congregations in the United States that reach out to immigrant populations" (members, 4%; elders, 5%; pastors, 6%; specialized clergy, 12%).

JUSTICE AND COMPASSION

PC(USA) Needs in the Justice and Compassion Goal Area: Ratings

✓ Asked the need in the PC(USA) for each of ten Justice and Compassion ministries, the response totals for "very great" and "great" vary by Panel group. The totals presented in Table 3 are sorted from highest to lowest based on members' responses:

- ✓ In three of four Panel groups, "preserving the environment as God's creation" receives the highest total of "very great" or "great" responses (members, 54%; elders, 57%; and specialized clergy, 70%). Pastors also rate this ministry highly (59%), but their highest rating is for "supporting emergency relief operations" (70%).
- ✓ Half or more in every sample give "very great" or "great" ratings to two other ministries: "increasing awareness of non-violent options for conflict resolution" (members, 52%; elders, 50%; pastors, 53%; specialized clergy, 70%) and "encouraging and supporting efforts to address the underlying causes of poverty" (51%; 51%; 59%; 70%).
- ✓ Besides those already mentioned, another ministry is rated as a "very great" or "great" need by more than two-thirds of specialized clergy: "providing opportunities for people to be involved in ministries of compassion and justice" (70%). While 58% of pastors so respond, many fewer members (39%) and elders (44%) do so.
- ✓ In all comparisons specialized clergy have the highest "very great" or "great" totals, except for "supporting emergency relief operations," so rated by slightly more pastors (70%, compared to 65%).
- ✓ Noticeably higher percentages of pastors and specialized clergy (70%; 65%) rate "supporting emergency relief operations" as a "very great" or "great" need than do members and elders (49%; 57%).
- ✓ In three of the four Panel groups, the lowest percentage responding "very great" or "great" need is for "sharing knowledge about what Presbyterians are doing in the area of justice and compassion" (members, 29%; pastors, 33%; specialized clergy, 40%). Among elders, 36% respond "very great" or "great" need for this ministry, slightly above the total for "helping people discern matters of injustice in the world" (33%).

JUSTICE AND COMPASSION

PC(USA) Needs in the Justice and Compassion Goal Area: Rankings

✓ Using the same list discussed on the previous page, panelists were asked to identify the most and second most important needs in the PC(USA) in the Justice and Compassion goal area. The combined choices, ordered from top to bottom based on members' responses, are presented in Table 4.

- ✓ No Panel group ranks these needs in the same order. Members and elders, however, share the same top five needs: "supporting emergency relief operations" (members, 29%; elders, 31%); "preserving the environment" (27%; 26%); "increasing awareness of non-violent options for conflict resolution" (26%; 23%); "supporting efforts of people who are already taking steps to improve their socio-economic situation" (25%; 24%); and "improving people's quality of life" (22%; 24%). ("Encouraging and supporting efforts to address the underlying causes of poverty" is also ranked by 23% of members as the most or second most important need.)
- ✓ Pastors and specialized clergy identify the same five top needs, including three of the top five among laity: "supporting emergency relief operations" (pastors, 44%; specialized clergy, 26%); "preserving the environment" (23%; 21%); and "increasing awareness of non-violent options for conflict resolution" (20%; 25%). The other two among ministers are "encouraging and supporting efforts to address the underlying causes of poverty" (26%; 29%) and "providing opportunities for people to be involved in ministries of compassion and justice" (31%; 31%).
- ✓ Four ministries are ranked more highly by members than by pastors: "preserving the environment" (members, 27%; pastors, 23%); "increasing awareness of non-violent options for conflict resolution" (26%; 20%); "supporting efforts of people who are already taking steps to improve their social and economic situation" (25%; 15%); and "improving people's quality of life and well-being" (22%; 14%).
- ✓ Very few rank "sharing knowledge about what Presbyterians are doing in the area of justice and compassion" as the most or second most important need (members, 7%; elders, 6%; pastors, 5%; specialized clergy, 4%). Also ranked high by small percentages are "building networks that support compassion and justice ministries" (10%; 11%; 12%; 12%) and "helping people discern matters of injustice in the world" (10%; 10%; 12%; 18%).

LEADERSHIP AND VOCATION

PC(USA) Needs in the Leadership and Vocation Goal Area: Ratings

✓ Asked the need in the PC(USA) for each of 16 Leadership and Vocation ministries, response totals for "very great" and "great" vary by group. The totals are presented in Table 5, ordered from highest to lowest based on members' responses.

- ✓ Large majorities of all Panel groups rate "attracting competent and highly motivated church professionals" as a "very great" or "great" need in the Leadership and Vocation goal area (members, 62%; elders, 68%; pastors, 65%; specialized clergy, 69%), followed by "helping congregations find pastoral leadership" (58%; 67%; 63%; 58%). No other ministry is rated as a "very great" or "great" need by a majority in all groups.
- ✓ "Helping small congregations" is rated higher by elders, pastors, and specialized clergy (combined "very great" or "great" need: 64%, 61%, and 56%, respectively) than by members (47%).
- ✓ More pastors and specialized clergy (54%; 58%) rate "providing training for elders and deacons" as a "very great" or "great" need than do members and elders (44%; 44%). In fact, in no comparison is the very great/great total higher among members than among specialized clergy, and in only two do members have a higher total than among pastors: "supporting opportunities for leadership by women" (41%; 31%) and "supporting opportunities for skills development, such as mentoring" (33%; 30%).

LEADERSHIP AND VOCATION

PC(USA) Needs in the Leadership and Vocation Goal Area: Rankings

✓ Combined most and second most important needs in the PC(USA) in the Leadership and Vocation goal area are presented in Table 6. No two Panel groups rank these needs identically, though members and pastors share the same top five needs.

- ✓ In the Leadership and Vocation goal area, "attracting competent and highly motivated church professionals" receives the highest total of most or second most important responses among members (30%), elders (28%), and specialized clergy (22%). While lower, the total among pastors (19%, tied with two others) is the third-highest for that group.
- ✓ "Helping members understand that their vocation is a call from God" receives the highest total of most or second most important combined responses among pastors (25%) and specialized clergy (22%). Among elders, "helping small congregations" has the second-highest total (26%); among members, "providing training for elders and deacons" (21%).
- ✓ Four ministries are ranked most or second-most important by fewer than one in ten panelists in every group: "helping Presbyterians discern whether they have a call from God to serve as ministers" (members, 4%; elders, 3%; pastors, 5%; specialized clergy, 4%); "supporting education among racial-ethnic populations" (7%; 5%; 4%; 7%); "supporting opportunities for skills development, such as mentoring" (7%; 5%; 5%; 4%); and "supporting opportunities for leadership by women" (9%; 7%; 2%; 4%).

SPIRITUALITY AND DISCIPLESHIP

PC(USA) Needs in the Spirituality and Discipleship Goal Area: Ratings

✓ Asked the need in the PC(USA) for each of 12 Spirituality and Discipleship ministries, combined "very great" and "great" responses vary among Panel groups. Table 7 shows the results, ordered from highest to lowest based on members' responses.

- ✓ Large majorities of all Panel groups rate as "very great" or "great" needs "reaching college students and young adults" (members, 72%; elders, 78%; pastors, 76%; specialized clergy, 69%); "helping families to identify and resist destructive pressures and temptations" (61%; 66%; 64%; 61%); and "strengthening Christian education" (60%; 64%; 63%; 60%).
- ✓ No other ministry is rated as a "very great" or "great" need by a majority in all groups, though a majority in two groups do so for these four: "supporting military chaplains in their work with young adults" (members, 52%; elders, 57%; pastors, 38%; specialized clergy, 41%); "providing resources to help strengthen faith practices" (49%; 56%; 62%; 49%); "articulating our faith theologically" (43%; 45%; 60%; 60%); and "interpreting our Reformed identity as Presbyterians" (35%; 37%; 51%; 55%).
- ✓ Two other ministries receive a majority of "very great" or "great" ratings from only a single group: "educating members to be exemplary citizens who are not only concerned with their rights, but also accepting of their responsibilities" (members, 46%; elders, 45%; pastors, 46%; specialized clergy, 52%) and "educating Presbyterians about stewardship" (39%; 45%; 60%; 48%).
- ✓ For the remaining three ministries, a minority in all groups rate each as a "very great" or "great" need: "providing resources for individual spiritual discernment" (members, 34%; elders, 34%; pastors, 44%; specialized clergy, 40%); "providing help in the discernment of spiritual gifts" (31%; 37%; 48%; 40%); and "developing spirituality and discipleship materials for immigrants to the United States who speak other languages" (28%; 33%; 35%; 45%).

SPIRITUALITY AND DISCIPLESHIP

PC(USA) Needs in the Spirituality and Discipleship Goal Area: Rankings

✓ Asked to name the most and second most important needs in the PC(USA) from the 12 listed for the Spirituality and Discipleship goal area, responses vary somewhat from group to group. Table 8 shows the results, ordered from highest to lowest based on the combined responses of members.

- ✓ None of the Panel groups rank these needs identically, though all groups share three needs in their top five:
 - "Helping families to identify and resist destructive pressures and temptations" ranks first for members and elders (members, 40%; elders, 32%; pastors, 26%; specialized clergy, 27%).
 - "Providing resources to help strengthen faith practices" ranks first among pastors (21%; 25%; 30%; 19%).
 - "Helping families to identify and resist destructive pressures and temptations" (40%; 32%; 26%; 27%) and "educating members to be exemplary citizens who are not only concerned with rights, but also accepting of their responsibilities" (21%; 18%; 12%; 27%) tie for the top rank among specialized clergy.
- ✓ Also among the top five ministries in all groups based on combined most and second most important rankings are "reaching college students and young adults" (members, 25%; elders, 26%; pastors, 25%; specialized clergy, 24%) and "strengthening Christian education" (32%; 30%; 24%; 22%).
- ✓ Of the other ministries, more members (13%) and elders (13%) than pastors (5%) and specialized clergy (4%) rank "supporting military chaplains in their work with young adults" as the most or second most important ministry need. The reverse is true for "articulating our faith theologically" (11%; 12%; 21%; 21%).
- ✓ Fewer than one in ten panelists in any group rank "providing resources for individual spiritual discernment" (members, 5%; elders, 4%; pastors, 9%; specialized clergy, 7%) or "developing spirituality and discipleship materials for immigrants" (8%; 6%; 5%; 7%) as the most or second most important ministry need.

COMPARATIVE FINDINGS

Selected Comparisons Within Goal Areas

- ✓ On balance, panelists rate:
 - Creating healthy congregations as a greater need than helping people become witnesses to their faith (Evangelism and Witness).
 - Activities that directly address problems as a greater need than activities that inform or connect people on such issues (Justice and Compassion).
 - The need for attracting competent church professionals as a greater need than training or resourcing those already serving (Leadership and Vocation).
 - Needs containing the word "spiritual" or "spirituality" among the lowest of any in the goal area with that name (Spirituality and Discipleship).

Selected Comparisons Between Goal Areas

- ✓ Overall, needs in the Evangelism and Witness goal area receive the highest ratings by all Panel groups, particularly by pastors. The needs in the Leadership and Vocation goal area receive the lowest ratings and rankings by all Panel groups.
- ✓ In particular, needs that receive relatively low ratings include:
 - Needs specifically mentioning Presbyterians (e.g., "helping communicate what being Presbyterian 'is all about'").
 - Needs concerning discernment such as "helping Presbyterians discern whether they have a call from God to serve as ministers."
 - Needs concerning multicultural, racial-ethnic, under-represented, or immigrant populations.

Selected Comparisons Between Panel Groups

- ✓ For most needs, the average rating of clergy is greater than the average rating of members or elders. One specific exception is "supporting military chaplains in their work with young adults" (Spirituality and Discipleship).
- ✓ The average rating of pastors is greater than that of specialized clergy concerning Evangelism and Witness needs and Spirituality and Discipleship needs, but is the reverse for Justice and Compassion needs and Leadership and Vocation needs.
- ✓ The percentage of specialized clergy who rate the ten ministry areas in the Justice and Compassion goal area as a "very great" or "great" need is consistently higher than the other three Panel groups.

Consolidated Ratings and Rankings

- ✓ The 48 ministry needs in the four goal areas were consolidated into one list to determine the overall ratings and rankings by Panel groups. The top five ministry needs as rated and ranked by each group resulted in a list of 15 ministries, which are presented in Table 9 (ordered from top to bottom by members' ratings with each group's top five shown in bold). (See the footnote to Table 9 for details on the calculations.)
- ✓ Overall, the ratings and rankings presented in Table 9 are consistent with the results presented in each goal area above. As reported above, all of the Panel groups rate and rank "developing vibrant, healthy congregations" as the most important need.
- ✓ The remainder of the list reflects the diversity of opinion among and within Panel groups regarding ratings of ministries as "very great" and "great" needs, in comparison to the ranking of the most important needs in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The diversity of opinion is most noticeable when comparing the specialized clergy's ratings and rankings with those of the other three groups.

COMPARATIVE FINDINGS

Consolidated Ratings and Rankings (cont.)

- ✓ Interestingly, only one need in the Leadership and Vocation goal area is included on the list: "attracting competent and highly motivated church professionals," which is ranked among the top five ministry needs by both members and elders (see also footnote 1).
- ✓ The only need in the Justice and Compassion goal area ranked in the top five by members and elders is "supporting emergency relief operations."

¹ For the ratings, panelists were free to rate every one of the 48 ministries as a "very great" or "great" need, but for the direct rankings they could choose only two ministries in each goal area as the "most important" or "second most important." In goal areas with the most ministries listed, the most important and second most important responses are thus spread over more options, in effect "diluting" the direct rankings. PREFERENCES FOR MISSION LOCATION

National or International?

- ✓ A final question reminded panelists that the work of the General Assembly Council "takes place in the United States as well as internationally," then asked: "Would you like to see the Council do mission entirely in the United States, entirely in other countries, or some combination of both?" Options ranged from 1, "entirely in the United States," to 9, "entirely in other countries"; the only other labeled option was 5, the midpoint: "half in U.S., half in other countries." ("Not sure" was coded as 10, but is recoded as 5 in the analysis on this page.)




Figure 2. Mission Priorities: National, International, or a Combination

- ✓ Few panelists would like all General Assembly Council mission done either entirely in the United States (5% or less) or entirely abroad (0.5% or less). Instead, most want a balance, although more want that balance tipped in favor of domestic mission than in favor of international mission (see Figure 2).

✓ Table 10 summarizes the same information, separately combining those responses that tilt to any degree toward U.S. mission and those that tilt to any degree toward international mission.

✓ Table 10 shows more clearly than Figure 2 the disproportionate support for U.S. mission over international mission. While the largest share in every group, around half, is either "not sure" or wants an equal balance between U.S. and international mission, among the rest, many more want the preponderance of mission to be in the United States than elsewhere. In general, about four times as many panelists want more U.S. than international mission, though the ratio varies from a low of 3.5 (specialized clergy) to a high of 4.4 (elders).
