# Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) The February 2011 Survey

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#### **OVERVIEW**

## What is the Presbyterian Panel?

The Presbyterian Panel consists of three nationally representative samples of groups affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.): elders (lay leaders) currently serving on session, other members, and ministers of the Word and Sacrament. (The session is the governing body in Presbyterian congregations.) For analysis, ministers are split into two groups based on current call: *pastors*, serving congregations, and *specialized clergy*, serving elsewhere. New samples are drawn every three years. Panel surveys are conducted quarterly, primarily by mail but with an online completion option.

The Panel is maintained and directed by the office of Research Services of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The first Panel was created in 1973 to provide a means for informing leaders of the opinions and activities of the rank and file across the church. Survey topics and questions are usually developed at the request of, and in consultation with, staff or elected members of national church entities. However, ultimate decisions on content and the disposition of Panel data are those of Research Services. Standards developed by the American Association of Public Opinion Research guide Panel surveys.

## **Current Survey**

The current survey is the tenth completed by the 2009-2011 Panel. Questionnaires were distributed on February 10, 2011. Most panelists received their copy by U.S. mail, but a subset (n = 907, or 32%) that had signed up for the service was notified via email. Non-respondents were sent a postcard reminder on February 28, 2011. Panelists who had received email notification about the survey but had not yet responded also received two email reminders, on February 22, 2011, and April 15, 2011. Returns were accepted through April 29, 2011. Response rates for this survey are: members, 45%; elders, 45%; ministers, 52%. All panelists had the option of completing the survey on the web, and 34% of responding members, 45% of responding elders, 56% of responding pastors, and 49% of responding specialized clergy did so.

### Sponsor and Topic

This survey was sponsored by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), a ministry of the General Assembly Mission Council's Compassion, Peace and Justice ministry area. PDA leaders wanted to understand how Presbyterians view the organization's effectiveness. They also wanted to know about Presbyterians' PDA experiences and their involvement in relief activities, both PDA-sponsored and other.

## This Report

The first half of this report uses text and graphics to summarize and explicate findings. A full list of survey questions and responses follows with tables that display the percentage distribution of responses to every question for each of the four Panel groups. Results are subject to sampling and other errors. In general, differences of less than 8% are not statistically meaningful.

Some analyses in this report, including those using theological orientation (p. 2), rely on responses of panelists to the initial questionnaire they completed in the fall of 2008. For more information on this earlier survey and responses of panelists to these questions, see the *Religious and Demographic Profile of Presbyterians*, 2008 (see next page for web availability and ordering information). Other analyses rely on data on congregations that congregational leaders provide at the end of the year in the Session Annual Statistical Report.

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### Changing Terminology

On July 10, 2011, the part of the church's constitution dealing with governance was replaced with a new document that changed some common church terms. In particular, "ministers of the Word and Sacrament" are now known as "teaching elders," and "elders" are now known as "ruling elders." In this report, we continue to use the older terms because they were in effect at the time the survey was completed by the Panel.

## **HIGHLIGHTS**


- ✓ Three-quarters of members, four in five elders, and about nine in ten ministers believe that it is *very important* or *important* for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to engage in the kind of work, in general, that Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) does (p. 1).
- ✓ More than seven in ten panelists in each group believe it is *very important* or *important* for the PC(USA) to respond to disasters in the United States, advise congregations that want to send volunteers to assist with disaster relief, partner with other organizations in disaster relief work and refugee aid, advise congregations on how to respond effectively to local disasters, advise presbyteries on how to respond effectively to disasters in their region, and aid refugees and other displaced persons (p. 1).
- ✓ Two-thirds of members, three-quarters of elders, and more than nine in ten ministers were *very familiar*, *familiar*, *somewhat familiar*, or *only a little familiar* with PDA before they received the questionnaire (p. 3).
- ✓ Among panelists who are familiar with PDA and have opinions on how effective PDA is in certain areas, more ministers than members and elders believe the ministry is *very effective* or *effective* in 12 of 13 areas (p. 3).
- ✓ Three-quarters or more of ministers and large minorities of members and elders believe that PDA is *very effective* or *effective* in working with other organizations involved in disaster relief, responding to U.S. disasters, and managing volunteers at work sites (p. 3).
- ✓ Almost all panelists in each group who have some familiarity with PDA and have an opinion *strongly agree* or *agree* that the funds that people give to PDA help provide a witness to God's love (p. 4).
- ✓ Almost all panelists in each group who have some familiarity with PDA and have an opinion believe PDA is *very faithful*, *faithful*, or *somewhat faithful* to its mission statement (p. 4).
- ✓ More than nine in ten panelists in each group believe there is an *excellent fit* or a *good fit* between the PDA mission statement and what PDA *should* be doing (p. 4).
- ✓ During the past two years majorities of panelists in each group have contributed money to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering (which helps fund PDA) or directly to PDA (p. 5).
- ✓ In each Panel group more than one-third contributed money in the past two years to PDA in response to the Haiti earthquake (p. 5).
- ✓ The median financial contribution to PDA for a specific disaster (including Haiti) was about \$100 (p. 5).
- ✓ More members and elders who contributed to a non-PC(USA) organization for emergency relief or disaster assistance in the past two years gave to the Salvation Army or American Red Cross than to any other non-PC(USA) organization (p. 6).
- ✓ During the past two years more pastors made contributions for emergency relief or disaster assistance to World Vision or Samaritan's Purse than to any other non-PC(USA) organization (p. 6).
- ✓ Elders, pastors, and specialized clergy who have given to PDA during the past two years are more likely than those who have not given to believe that PDA's administrative costs are low, that PDA's work promotes PC(USA) identity, and that PDA uses funds as donors intended. The same is true for elders and pastors who contributed as relates to their belief that PDA provides a witness to God's love (p. 7).
- ✓ Compared with elders from small and medium-sized congregations, more elders from large congregations report that their congregation sent a work team to help PDA with disaster assistance during the past two years (p. 8).

## PERSPECTIVES ON PDA'S WORK

## Importance of PDA's Work in General


Figure 1. Importance of PDA's Work in General

✓ Three-quarters of members (74%), four in five elders (80%), and about nine in ten ministers (pastors, 90%; specialized clergy, 86%) believe that it is *very important* or *important* for the PC(USA) to engage in the type of work, in general, that Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) does (see also Figure 1).

## Different Perceptions of the Importance of Disaster Aid?

When asked on an earlier Panel survey (August 2010), more members, elders, pastors, and specialized clergy viewed the type of work that PDA does as very important or important for the PC(USA) to do than did so in the current survey. (Figure 2 provides details about differences across dates.)

The August 2010 survey asked panelists about the importance of the activities of ten different Compassion, Peace and Justice ministries, while the February 2011 survey asked about the importance of PDA's work alone, and this may have influenced how panelists responded. In addition, the August 2010 survey was administered eight months after the earthquake in Haiti, a disaster that garnered a great deal of attention in the United States. The February 2011 survey was administered another six months later, when memories of the earthquake may have started to ebb. Most panelists completed the February survey before the tsunami and earthquake in Japan, which took place on March 11.

The August Panel survey asked panelists about the importance of the General Assembly Mission Council, the denomination's mission agency, doing this work, while the February Panel asked about the PC(USA), in general, doing the work. This also could have affected responses.

#### Importance of Specific PDA Activities

- ✓ Aiding refugees, helping U.S. communities facing disasters, and working with congregations and other organizations are among the disaster relief and recovery assistance activities that the most panelists believe are important for the PC(USA) to carry out (from a list of 13). More than seven in ten panelists in each group believe that it is *very important* or *important* for the denomination to:
  - Respond to disasters in the United States (members, 83%; elders, 83%; pastors, 91%; specialized clergy, 91%).
  - Advise congregations that want to send volunteers to assist with disaster relief (80%; 82%; 87%; 91%).
  - Partner with other organizations in disaster relief work and refugee aid (80%; 79%; 88%; 89%).
  - Advise congregations on how to respond effectively to local disasters (80%; 73%; 79%; 81%).
  - Advise presbyteries on how to respond effectively to disasters in their region (77%; 80%; 79%; 81%).
  - Aid refugees and other displaced persons (74%; 75%; 79%; 79%).

## PERSPECTIVES ON PDA'S WORK

## Importance of Specific PDA Activities (cont.)


- ✓ Supporting long-term recovery and aiding other disaster-torn countries are viewed as equally important as the activities listed on page 1 by ministers, but as less important by members and elders. At least three-quarters of ministers—but fewer members and elders—believe that it is *very important* or *important* for the PC(USA) to:
  - Support the long-term recovery of communities affected by disaster (members, 66%; elders, 71%; pastors, 75%; specialized clergy, 81%).
  - Respond to disasters in other countries (60%; 64%; 86%; 84%).
- ✓ Managing volunteer teams is something solid majorities of panelists in each group believe is important.

  About three-quarters of pastors—but somewhat fewer members, elders, and specialized clergy—believe that it is *very important* or *important* for the PC(USA) to:
  - Manage volunteer and work teams at disaster sites (members, 61%; elders, 66%; pastors, 76%; specialized clergy, 69%).
  - Manage specialized volunteer teams that provide consultation, program design, and training in disaster assistance (58%; 63%; 73%; 69%).
- Somewhat fewer panelists value PC(USA) involvement in disaster-related education and training and in advocating for refugee resettlement. Around half to two-thirds of panelists in each group believe it is *very important* or *important* for the PC(USA) to:
  - Educate the public about how long disaster recovery can take (members, 60%; elders, 61%; pastors, 63%; specialized clergy, 69%).
  - Provide disaster preparedness training for synods (55%; 56%; 53%; 60%).
  - Promote refugee resettlement (48%; 51%; 58%; 64%).

# Theological Orientation and the Perceived Importance of PDA's Work

More theologically *moderate* and theologically *very liberal* or *liberal* elders, pastors, and specialized clergy than their theologically *very conservative* or *conservative* counterparts believe that it is *very important* or *important* for the PC(USA) to engage in the type of work, in general, that PDA does. Members with different theological orientations, however, view PDA's work as important in roughly equal proportions.

It's possible that many Presbyterians link disaster aid to social justice work with which theological liberals may be more sympathetic.



## **ASSESSING PDA'S WORK**

## Familiarity with PDA




Figure 4. Familiarity with PDA

✓ Almost all ministers are at least a little familiar with PDA, as are most members and elders. Before receiving the questionnaire, two-thirds of members (65%), three-quarters of elders (76%), and more than nine in ten pastors (99%) and specialized clergy (93%) were either *very familiar*, *familiar*, *somewhat familiar*, or *only a little familiar* with PDA. (Figure 4 provides additional information.)

## Beliefs About PDA's Effectiveness<sup>1</sup>

- ✓ More ministers than members and elders believe PDA is effective in 12 of 13 areas in which PDA works.<sup>2</sup>
- ✓ More than three-quarters of ministers—but smaller majorities of members and elders—believe PDA is *very effective* or *effective* in:
  - Responding to U.S. disasters (members, 67%; elders, 68%; pastors, 83%; specialized clergy, 86%).
  - Partnering with other organizations in disaster relief and refugee aid (58%; 66%; 80%; 78%).
  - Managing volunteers and work teams at disaster sites (58%; 61%; 76%; 78%).
- PDA is seen as *very effective* or *effective* in three areas by majorities of elders, pastors, and specialized clergy, but by only half or fewer members.
  - Managing specialized volunteer teams that provide consultation, program design, and training in disaster assistance (members, 50%; elders, 55%; pastors, 65%; specialized clergy, 71%).
  - Responding to disasters in other countries (46%; 56%; 64%; 72%).
  - Supporting the long-term recovery of communities affected by disaster (46%; 56%; 64%; 72%).
- ✓ Majorities of ministers and half or fewer members and elders think that PDA is very effective or effective in:
  - Advising presbyteries on how to respond effectively to disasters in their region (members, 50%; elders, 45%; pastors, 60%; specialized clergy, 69%).
  - Advising congregations that want to send volunteers to assist with disaster relief and recovery (49%; 47%; 60%; 64%).
  - Advising congregations on how to respond effectively to disasters in their community (45%; 42%; 53%; 60%).
  - Aiding refugees and other displaced persons (41%; 40%; 53%; 54%).

# Beliefs about PDA's Effectiveness (cont.)3

- ✓ Less than half but more than one-quarter in each group believe that PDA is *very effective* or *effective* in three other areas:
  - Educating the public about how long disaster recovery can take and how complex recovery can be (members, 34%; elders, 30%; pastors, 32%; specialized clergy, 33%).
  - Providing disaster preparedness training for presbyteries and synods (30%; 29%; 42%; 42%).
  - Promoting refugee resettlement (27%; 31%; 47%; 48%).

### Other Beliefs About PDA4

- ✓ More than seven in eight panelists in each group *strongly agree* or *agree* with these statements:
  - Funds given to PDA help provide a witness to God's love (members, 99%; elders, 99%; pastors, 99%; specialized clergy, 100%).
  - PDA uses funds given to it as the donors intended (95%; 94%; 94%; 95%). (Small majorities of members (59%) and elders (52%) and about half as many pastors (27%) and specialized clergy (35%) are *neutral* or not sure about this item.)
  - The work of PDA promotes the PC(USA)'s identity (94%; 96%; 94%; 96%).
  - The percentage of funds given to PDA that are used to pay administrative costs is low (88%; 94%; 91%; 98%). (Majorities of members (74%) and elders (65%) and large minorities of pastors (44%) and specialized clergy (49%) are *neutral or not sure*.)


#### **PDA Mission Statement**

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance enables congregations and mission partners of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to witness to the healing love of Christ through caring for communities adversely affected by crises and catastrophic events.

## **Opinion About PDA's Mission Statement**

Panelists with some familiarity with PDA were asked how faithful they believe PDA is to its mission statement (see above), which was shown on the survey. Around nine in ten panelists in each group (members, 93%; elders, 88%; pastors, 92%; specialized clergy, 94%) believe PDA is *very faithful* or *faithful* to the mission statement.<sup>5</sup> (Figure 5 offers details.)

✓ At least nine in ten panelists in each group (members, 90%; elders, 93%; pastors, 93%; specialized clergy, 91%) believe that there is an *excellent fit* or *good fit* between the PDA mission statement and what PDA *should* be doing.


## Connecting with PDA

- ✓ One way panelists have connected with PDA is by contributing money to support the ministry. During the past two years more panelists in each group have supported the ministry by giving money to the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering or giving money designated for work related to a specific disaster than have supported PDA financially in other ways:
  - Contributed money to the One Great Hour of Sharing churchwide special offering, which helps fund PDA (members, 77%; elders, 88%; pastors, 89%; specialized clergy, 81%).
  - Contributed money to PDA directly with funds designated for disaster relief and recovery work related to a specific disaster (53%; 59%; 76%; 65%).
  - Contributed money to PDA but not related to any specific disaster (28%; 29%; 30%; 24%).
  - Contributed money to PDA through the alternative giving opportunity program (18%; 18%; 18%; 16%).
  - Contributed money to PDA in honor of, or in memory of, another person (13%; 11%; 7%; 5%).
- Three PDA information outlets have helped more ministers than members and elders connect with the organization. During the past two years, at least two in five pastors and at least one-quarter of specialized clergy—but many fewer members and elders—have connected with PDA by:
  - Reading a PDA Rapid Information Network email bulletin (members, 13%; elders, 14%; pastors, 54%; specialized clergy, 38%).
  - Visiting the PDA website (12%; 16%; 51%; 32%).
  - Reading an issue of *Mission Mosaic* magazine (8%; 11%; 40%; 27%).
- ✓ Fewer than three in ten panelists in each group have connected with PDA in six other ways during the same period:
  - Viewed the NBC documentary *Coming Home: Hurricane Katrina Five Years Later*, produced by PDA (members 19%; elders, 18%; pastors, 22%; specialized clergy, 15%).
  - Created one or more Gift of the Heart kits (10%; 16%; 24%; 12%).
  - Viewed the ABC documentary *Kepulihan: Stories from the Tsunami*, produced by PDA (8%; 8%; 6%; 3%).
  - Talked or exchanged email with a member of the PDA Advisory Committee, PDA National Response Team, or PDA staff (5%; 7%; 29%; 17%).
  - Volunteered at a PDA work site (4%; 6%; 20%; 12%).
  - Received disaster preparedness training from PDA (2%; 4%; 13%; 7%).
- ✓ For 13 of 14 PDA-related activities shown above, more panelists who participated in each activity during the past two years report it was a *positive experience* than report it was a *negative experience*.<sup>6</sup>

# Contributing to Disaster Relief and Recovery<sup>7</sup>

More than one-third of panelists in each group (members, 36%; elders, 42%; pastors, 55%; specialized clergy, 53%) report having contributed money to PDA during the past two years with the donation designated for relief and recovery assistance related to the earthquake in Haiti (see Figure 6 also). The median donation for a specific disaster was about \$100.



# Contributing to Disaster Relief and Recovery (cont.)


Figure 7. Non-PC(USA) Organizations to Which Panelists Have Contributed Most Recently for Disaster Relief

- ✓ Among the non-PC(USA) organizations to which panelists most recently contributed money for disaster aid and emergency relief in the past two years, the Salvation Army and the American Red Cross attracted contributions from more members and elders than any others did (see Figure 7).
- ✓ About one in six pastors—but fewer panelists in the other groups—contributed to World Vision for disaster aid and relief.

#### Financial Contributions to PDA and Other PDA Involvement

Contact with PDA is linked with financial contributions to PDA. Panelists in each group who have viewed any of a variety of PDA materials (Rapid Information Network email bulletin, *Mission Mosaic* magazine issue, NBC documentary *Coming Home*, ABC documentary *Kepulihan*, or PDA website) during the past two years are more likely to have made financial contributions to PDA during the same period (see Figure 8).

The same is true for panelists who have created one or more Gift of the Heart kits or volunteered at a PDA work site during the past two years. More panelists who did either of these than those who did not contributed to PDA.

Whether viewing PDA materials leads to other forms of PDA involvement, or Presbyterians who give time or money to PDA are more likely then to view PDA materials, or some combination, is not clear.


#### Contributions to PDA and Beliefs About PDA's Work

The survey asked panelists with at least a little familiarity with PDA how much they agree or disagree with four positive statements about the organization:

- ✓ PDA uses funds given to PDA as the donors intended.
- ✓ The percentage of funds given to PDA that PDA uses to pay administrative costs is low.
- ✓ The work of PDA promotes the PC(USA)'s identity.
- ✓ Funds given to PDA help provide a witness to God's love.


More elders and pastors who have given money directly to PDA during the past two years than those who have not *strongly agree* or *agree* with each of these statements (see Figures 9 and 10). More specialized clergy who have given money to PDA than those who have not *strongly agree* or *agree* with the statements about low administrative costs, promoting PC(USA) identity, and following donors' intentions. (Those who are *neutral or not sure* are excluded from these analyses.)

In contrast, members' beliefs about PDA are not related to giving to PDA. Members are less well informed about PDA than other panelists. Educating members may boost their assessment of PDA and their giving.

## CONGREGATIONAL INVOLVEMENT IN RELIEF


#### Involvement with PDA-Related Relief Activities

- ✓ One-quarter of elders (25%) report that their congregation or a group in it sent a work team to help with PDA disaster recovery during the past two years.
- $\checkmark$  Of these, most elders (92%) believe that this was a *positive experience*.
- ✓ Very few elders report that their congregation or a group in it connected with PDA during the past two years in three other ways:
  - Viewed the documentary Coming Home: Hurricane Katrina Five Years Later (6%).
  - Viewed the documentary Kepulihan: Stories from the Tsunami (2%).
  - Received disaster assistance from PDA (1%).
- ✓ Half or more of the elders whose congregation or group viewed one of the documentaries or received disaster assistance believe that each was a *positive experience* (most of the rest describe the experience as *neutral*):
  - Viewed the documentary *Kepulihan* (100%).
  - Viewed the documentary *Coming Home* (86%).
  - Received disaster assistance from PDA (50%).

# Congregational Involvement with PDA and Congregational Size

Congregations of different sizes are equally likely to have interacted with PDA in three of four ways during the past two years: viewing the documentary *Coming Home*, viewing the documentary *Kepulihan*, and receiving disaster assistance from PDA. The one exception is in the area of sending work teams to help PDA with disaster assistance. More large congregations than medium-sized or small congregations have done this. It may be easier for congregations with more members to organize a work team.

Also, responses to the August 2010 Compassion, Peace and Justice Panel survey show that most congregations, regardless of size, participate in the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering, which helps fund PDA.

#### Likelihood of Small-Group Use of DVDs on Disaster Relief

✓ Among panelists who are part of a small group or class in a congregation with equipment to show DVDs, at least three in five (members, 60%; elders, 63%; pastors, 67%; specialized clergy, 60%) who are in a position to know believe the group would be *very likely*, *likely*, or *somewhat likely* to use a DVD about disaster relief.
