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Introduction to the PC(USA) Peace Discernment Process

- •Initiated by 219th GA (2010) in response to 8 presbytery overtures
- •Called for a broadly participatory discernment process to:
 - (1) Seek clarity as to God's call to the church to embrace nonviolence as its fundamental response to the challenges of violence, terror, and war; and
 - (2) Identify, explore, and nurture new approaches to active peacemaking and nonviolence, reporting to the 221st General Assembly (2014) with recommendations for policy and action.
- Created a Peace Discernment Steering Team to design & guide the process



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"Encountering the Gospel of Peace Anew: An Invitation to Discernment & Witness"

- •Interim Report of the Peace Discernment Steering Team to 220th GA
- •An invitation to the whole PC(USA) to participate in a time of discernment, looking at peacemaking and nonviolence in the 21st century.
- Provides background for peace discernment conversations
- Poses 20 Questions for Reflection/Discernment

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What do we mean by "Discernment?"

- Not just another "study"
- •Discernment involves slowing down and listening together for God's voice speaking in our midst.
- •Through discernment, we seek wisdom, clarity, and insight as to what God is calling us to be and do, here and now.
- •In discernment, we try to see the world through God's eyes and align our words and actions with God's will.



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Engaging Presbyterians in the Conversation

- •We want to engage a broad cross-section of the PC(USA)
- Churches that have a history of involvement in peacemaking
- Churches that may be new to peacemaking
- •Women and men, youth and young adults, different racial/ethnic groups, liberals and conservatives
- •Individuals who have served in the military and those who have not
- •Campus ministers, faculty, and students at Presbyterian-related colleges
- Presbyterian Seminaries
- Presbyteries



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3 Formats for Peace Discernment Conversations

•Option 1: 4-hour Retreat

•Option 2: 4-Week Sunday School Series (Each session is 1 hour long)

Option 3: 5-week Intensive Series (Each session is 2 hours long)



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Facilitating a Peace Discernment Conversation

•Assemble a group of 8-10 people (if more, divide into smaller groups)

It could be a never-before-assembled group, or an already established group such as an Adult Sunday School Class, a Women's Group, a Men's Group, a Youth or Young Adult Group, the Session and/or Deacons

- •Select a format & schedule with place, date(s), and time
- •Secure commitments from participants
- •Make sure you have a scribe in each small group who will take notes on the conversation

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Next Steps in the Church-wide Peace Discernment Process

- •Nov. 2012-May 2013 Peace Discernment Conversations take place in presbyteries, congregations, and colleges, and reports are sent in.
- •April-Nov. 2013 -- The Peace Discernment Steering Team analyzes and distills input from presbyteries, churches, colleges, and individuals, incorporating it into a Report and Recommendations to the 221st GA (2014)
- •Jan. 2014 -- The Report and Recommendations are submitted to ACSWP for approval.
- •June 2014 -- The 221st GA (2014) is asked to receive the Report and Recommendations for a two-year period of study.
- •June 2016 -- The 222nd GA (2016) takes final action.
