Status of the Pandemic

- In 2009, about 33.3 million people were living with HIV
- Prevalence continues to increase in Eastern Europe,
 Asia, and Sub-Saharan Africa
- AIDS-related deaths peaked in 2004 at 2.2 million (25 million people have died since beginning)
- In 2008, 430,000 new infections occurred among children under age 15



Who suffers the most?

- 80% of new infections are transmitted sexually and could be prevented by consistent condom use
- Women constitute 35% of all HIV infections in Asia -- more than 90% of 1.7 million women living with HIV in Asia were infected by their husbands/partners while in long term relationships
- In 2008, 61 000 maternal deaths were due to HIV
- Increasingly, women exchange sex for money due to economic necessity



Who suffers the most?

- 10% of new infections are caused by unsafe injecting drug use
- Opioid substitution therapy with methadone or buprenorphine (with provision of sterile equipment) reduces HIV infection and does not increase injecting drug use.
- Laws criminalizing the possession of injecting equipment or substitution therapy are major barriers in the HIV response.
- Problem is worse in prisons



Who suffers the most?


Unprotected sex between men accounts for 5% -10% of HIV infections and is resurging as the
predominant mode of HIV transmission in the
developed world.

• 80 countries criminalize same sex behavior along with extreme stigma.

Only a small share of funding is focused on this population




- For every 2 people on HIV treatment, 5 are becoming newly infected
- 1/3 of people living with HIV are co-infected with tuberculosis
- 45% of pregnant women living with HIV received treatment in 2008
- 4 million people living with HIV are receiving treatment; 10 million more need it






And in Our Country

 More than 1 million people are living in the U.S. with HIV; 21% of those are unaware of their infection.



- Gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men account for more than half of new infections each year; rate of infection for MSM is more than 40 times that for other men or for women
- Injection drug users represent 12% of annual new HIV infections and 19% of those living with HIV.
- Although more men than women have HIV, if new HIV infections continue at their current rate, women with HIV may soon outnumber men with HIV.

Rates of Diagnoses of HIV Infection among Adult and Adolescent Females, 2008—37 States and 5 U.S. Dependent Areas



Note. Data include persons with a diagnosis of HIV infection regardless of stage of disease at diagnosis. Data from 37 states and 5 U.S. dependent areas with confidential name-based HIV infection reporting since at least January 2005. All displayed data have been estimated. Estimated numbers resulted from statistical adjustment that accounted for reporting delays, but not for incomplete reporting. Rates are per 100,000 population.



New HIV infections

Over 7,000 new HIV infections each day

- About 97% are in low and middle income countries
- About 1,000 are in children under 15 years of age
- About 6,000 are in adults aged 15 years and older of whom:
 - almost 51% are women
 - about 41% are among young
 - people (15 24)

 - Congregation to congregation




What can U.S. churches do?


